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Writing Process

Writing is a process that involves at least some distinct steps. It is known as a recursive process. While you are revising, you might have to return to the prewriting step to develop and expand your ideas.

1. Brainstorming ÷ It is an informal way of generating topics to write about, or points to make about your

your topic. It can be done at any time during the writing process. You can brainstorm the topics for a whole paper, or just a conclusion or an example.

The important points about brainstorming is that there should be no pressure to be "brilliant" student should simply open their minds to whatever pops into them.

2. Mind Map ÷ Mind mapping is a technique for outlining information in diagrams using written text as well as lines, symbols, keywords, colors and images. A mind map is visual diagram used to record and organize information in such a way that the brain finds it captivating and easy to process.

3. Drafting ÷ The next step of the writing process involves drafting. During drafting, the writer puts his ideas into complete thoughts, such as sentences and paragraphs. The writer organizes his ideas in a way that allows the reader to understand his message.

4. Evaluation:- The evaluation step includes peer and teacher proofing as well as editing. The teacher provides a list of questions and instructions that is both general (e.g. spelling, grammar) and specific (e.g. number of paragraphs, sentence length) that guides the evaluator through this stage of the process.

5. Reviewing:- The writing process is a specific set of steps intended to help you create an original text. The process helps by explaining what you need to do and when you need to do it.

6. Editing:- Editing involves looking at each sentence carefully, and making sure that it is well designed and serves its purpose. Proofreading involves checking for grammatical and punctuation errors, spelling mistakes etc. Proofing is the final stage of the writing process.
